MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR: DR. MARC RONERT, 38

Doctor helps provide free surgery to patients in Peru

Foundation helps children who suffer from a loss of skin.

In December, Dr. Marc Ronert was one of 17 medical professionals, led by the Care for Skin Foundation, who flew to Peru to offer reconstructive surgery to children who have suffered skin loss from accidents, tumors, burns, scars or genetic abnormalities.

A plastic and reconstructive surgeon, Ronert and others donated their time and experience.

Ronert, 38, is the president and medical director of the Care for Skin Foundation.

While in Peru for two weeks, doctors met with 130 patients, most younger than 5. Seventy were able to receive treatment, he said.

patients and determine whom we could operate on with adequate time for follow-up while we are there," he said.

"Using my skills as a plastic surgeon on patients who are unable to afford necessary treatments is one of the most gratifying moments in my profession," he said. "Often, with simple reconstructive surgical procedures we are able to change someone's life within just a few minutes. To not offer this to pa-

tients in need would be unthinkable."

Born in Germany, Ronert said he had wanted to become a physician since he was 3.

"I remember dissecting fish," he said. "I had a little doctor's kit."

His decision to specialize in reconstructive surgery came in medical school when a professor influenced him. "I became one of his residents."

A graduate of the Heinrich Heine University School of Medicine, Ronert received medical training and education abroad and in the United States.

His wife, Joanna, is president, founder and CEO of Image Skincare, an international company with its 40,000-squarefoot corporate headquarters in Lantana.

Ronert is the company's director. The two met at an international conference where he was a guest speaker. They live in Palm Beach Gardens with their 3-and-a-half-year-old twins Zurich and Milana. They have a second home in Berlin.

Founded in 2011, The Care for Skin Foundation's goal is to provide reconstructive surgery to those in need and to donate money to organizations such as Resurge and SmileTrain, which coordinate medical missions to third world countries where doctors perform surgeries on patients with cleft lips, burn wounds and hand deformities, as well as other operations.
